

What should I major in?

- Major does not matter!
 - Some majors (such as Health Promotion, Food and Nutrition Science, Biology, and Exercise and Sport Science) may be more convenient than others.
 - Pre-PT and pre-OT are not majors.
- Challenge yourself, take a full-load (15/16+ hours per semester), and pursue things that interest you.
- Overall GPA vs. Science GPA/Prerequisite GPA
 - Most allied health schools will calculate a prerequisite GPA, but may also calculate a science GPA for application evaluation.
 - Science GPA = Biology, Chemistry, Math, Physics (BCMP) or sometimes just BCP

Is AP credit accepted?

The policies regarding acceptance of AP credit vary greatly amongst allied health programs in the state. You will need to check the individual schools that you are applying to for their AP policy and check frequently.

For **AA** programs:

they will generally accept AP with the exception of Medical College of Wisconsin, others may have stipulations to be aware of though such as certain scores like CWRU

of state program policies regarding AP credit

For **PT** programs in state:

Emory does NOT accept AP credit

Georgia State lists that they do NOT accept AP credit for PSYC (they made exceptions this past year) and all other AP credits are subject to committee review (however they are generally NOT accepted)

For **OT** programs in state:

Georgia State lists that they do NOT accept AP credit

What is the GRE?

- The GRE is the test you'll need to apply to most allied health programs
- GRE contains 3 sections:
 - 1. Quantitative
 - 2. Verbal
 - 3. Essay
- GRE Composite scores range 260-340
 - Each section (quantitative & verbal) is scored 130-170
 - Writing scores range from 0-6, in half point increments
 - A score of 305 is ~50th percentile
- The length of the GRE is now \sim 3 hours and 45 minutes.

FAQ regarding the GRE

• Is there any required coursework pre-GRE?

■ No. Since the exam is a "General" exam, no specific coursework is required before taking this exam.

When/Where can I take the test?

The GRE General Test is offered on campus at the University Testing Center. It is typically offered Monday through Friday, with two testing sessions per day. Students usually sit for the exam January-May as they head into the application cycle.

What is the policy regarding re-takes

- You can take the test once every 21 days, up to five times within any continuous rolling 12-month period (365 days). This applies even if you canceled your scores on a test taken previously.
- Retakes are not recommended, unless absolutely necessary

How long will my scores be valid?

ETS keeps your scores on file for a period of 5 years following the date you took the test

How should I prepare?

- You can study for the GRE on your own or take a GRE prep-course
- Key is to make a study plan and take advantage of practice tests!

MCAT for AA

- Most AA programs will accept GRE or MCAT. I <u>highly</u> suggest the GRE.
- Has 4 sections: Biological and Biochemical Foundations, Chemical and Physical Foundations, Psychological, Social, and Biological Foundations of Behavior, and Critical Analysis and Reasoning Skills
- These are the *minimum* courses needed before the MCAT:

BIOL 1107/L and BIOL 1108/L

CHEM 1211/L and CHEM 1212/L

CHEM 2211/L

BCMB 3100 or BCMB 4010 & 4020

PHYS 1111/L and PHYS 1112/L

- MCAT costs \$320, GRE \$205
- University of Colorado is only school to require MCAT instead of GRE

Shadowing

- Shadowing involves observing professionals in your intended field
 - Hands off, observation only
 - Experience reality of being an allied health professional—not always about healing or curing!
- No standard minimum number of hours for allied health schools, but >100 is a good benchmark.
 - Variety of shadowing settings is essential for OT, PT. Strive for 3-4 different settings
- Start with your family healthcare providers, if possible.
 - Connect with campus clubs, they can point you in right direction.
- Do not engage in activity that could be considered practice of medicine!
 - Especially important for medical mission trips and abroad experiences.

PPAO Study Abroad

- Health in Belize (Maymester)
- Health in Cuba (13 days in June)

- All programs meet UGA's Experiential Learning requirement
- All programs require BIOL 1107/L complete and to be enrolled in BIOL 1108/L by the time of application.

Volunteering

- Volunteering involves doing good work and giving back to your community.
 - You want to be a healthcare professional to help people? Well, how have you so far?
- Volunteer experiences do not have to be in a healthcare setting!
 - PA schools recommend volunteering in a healthcare and non-healthcare setting.
- No minimum hours, simply show consistent level of commitment.
 - Find something where you're helping regularly, not just one-offs.
 - Follow your passion!
- Keep record of experiences.
 - Dates, location, who you worked with, what you did, etc.
 - You will not be able to simply upload a resume to most applications.

 - Allied Health schools like applicants who can manage their time well and are engaged in the community

 - Be ACTIVE not PASSIVE

Research

- Research is favorable for allied health schools, but is certainly not required.
 - Can do it for course credit, for pay, or as a volunteer.
- Only do research if you're actually interested in it.

Does not have to be medical or translational!

- Search UGA departmental websites for possible research mentors.
 - Email professors detailing who you are and that you're interested in their work.
 - Ask about current projects.

Letters of Evaluation for Allied Health Schools

- Most programs require three letters:
 - 1 healthcare provider (PT, OT, AA, CRNA, GC, etc.)
 - 1 professor (preferably in major or in prerequisite course)
 - Additional letter(s) from another academic professional, healthcare provider, supervisor, or someone who knows you well enough to speak positively on your behalf.
- Letters should come from people who know you!
 - Will need to describe you as an individual—behavior, character traits, maturity-level, etc.

Recent PT Admissions Data

- 85 UGA students were accepted into 34 different PT schools.
- 93 Applicants via PTCAS
- 91% UGA acceptance rate
- Average GPA (overall/science) for accepted applicants: 3.64/3.43
- Average GRE percentile (Quantitative/Verbal) for accepted applicants: 151.58/151.5
- 2022-2023 National Data 72% national acceptance rate
- National Average GPA (overall/science) for accepted applicants: 3.55/3.34
- National Average GRE percentile (Quantitative/Verbal) for accepted applicants: 149.01/148.74
- Gap years (40% of accepted students took at least a full year; longest was 11 years)

Recent OT Admissions Data (don't have last years as OTCAS did not upload it)

University of Georgia Students

- Average GPA: 3.6
- Average GRE Scores:
 - Analytical Writing: 4
 - Quantitative: 150
 - Verbal: 152
- Average Age of Applicants: 23

How do I apply?

Centralized Application Service

- GC Admissions Match
- PTCAS (for PT school)
- OTCAS (for OT school)
- CASAA (for AA school)
- *Note: Not all programs participate in these CAS systems. Make sure to research your programs of interest to determine if additional institution applications are required.

Supplemental Applications

 Most programs will also require a supplemental application for the institution's graduate program, as well as application fees. Be sure to research all components of the application to ensure yours is considered complete.
